The 5 Components of Montessori Education

at Briar Vista

- 1. **Trained Montessori Teachers**-Each teacher at Briar Vista has been trained and certified through the Montessori Teacher Education Institute of Atlanta or the Association Montessori Internationale.
- The Multi-Age Classroom- Our Montessori classrooms are structured as follows: Primary Years (Grades Pre-K & K); Lower Elementary (Grades 1 & 2 and Grades 2 & 3); Upper Elementary (Grades 4 & 5)
- 3. Using Montessori Materials- Students use practical life materials at the lower elementary level to improve fine motor skills such as pouring and spooning. The golden beads are used to introduce decimals and the place value system. In the upper elementary students use Grammar Boxes and symbols to teach parts of speech and racks and tubes to teach long division.
- 4. Child Directed Work- Montessori education supports children in choosing meaningful and challenging work that captures their interest, leading to engagement, intrinsic motivation, sustained attention, and a sense of responsibility to oneself and others. This child-directed work is supported by the design and flow of the Montessori classroom, which is created to ignite each child's curiosity and to provide the opportunity to work in calm, uncluttered spaces either individually or with peers.
- 5. Uninterrupted Work Periods- The students complete a 3-hour morning work cycle, during which they complete lessons in all subject areas at their own pace. The Montessori curriculum consists of Practical life, Sensorial, Language, Math, Science, Social Studies/ Geography, and Art. Children are introduced to lessons on a 1 on 1 basis or in small groups.
